A good trick question: Which came first, the Bible or the church? Of course the answer is obvious from history; the church did, because much of the New Testament was written to it. We know from as far back as 151 CE that church leaders, *already in office*, rejected the denial of the Hebrew Bible as irrelevant, seeing in it numerous references to Jesus and his ministry. So the Hebrew Bible was included, along with the four Gospels as we know them. As time progressed, the letters of Paul, along with other general missives, finally completed the "Canon" as we have it today. "Canon" comes from a Greek term meaning measure or ruler, and the term came to be used as a "list" of scriptures felt to be inspired by God, and useful to the church for its instruction. [II Timothy 3:16] Different church bodies include other books and works as additions, some more or less, but the basic English Bible we use is common to all.

Another question: Which came first, the faith or the church? To recognize the dynamics of just how things evolved, we must examine the closing chapters of each Gospel and read on into the first chapters of the Acts of the Apostles. There we will understand how the church formed, after the faith spread.

How did the faith spread? Mass advertising? Print media? Radio or T.V.? Printed material of any kind? None of the above. You may say it spread "elbow to elbow" - kitchen to sidewalk - shop to market - life to life - person to person!

How did the faith come to a person, in order to go from person to person? From the Holy Spirit of God. [John 16: 7-15] Believers in Jesus Christ receive the Spirit the moment they receive Him by faith. We believe that that Spirit is the instigator of a person coming to faith in the first place. The individual will see something in the person who speaks to them, or from the spoken word however encountered. That is how faith is formed in individuals. We also understand that the Spirit uses the word of God - the Bible, to convince individuals of the truth of what they are encountering. When the Spirit entered the world at the first Pentecost, mighty demonstrations of his power were obvious. People took notice, and wanted to be a part of the loving community it formed. Thus the church was started.

Do you think it is any different today? I don't. Want to be a part of a growth effort this year precisely patterned after Biblical example? Stay close. We plan a continuing effort-free - and easily teachable (for me too) to "go get 'em".

Read Acts Chapter 1, and look at verse 8. Where is your Jerusalem? Our series of investigations will begin with the 1st Sunday in Lent, and continue on for the foreseeable future. Patterns. Step-by-step. One at a time. We'll see it all, provided of course that we see you in church.

My Dear Pastor Dave;

I am inspired to write you particularly so because I believe that this is the time for an uphill march to Macedonia for Trinity Reformed Church - that is 2009. Please keep an open mind and please do not preempt nor attempt to reach a conclusion until you have put it into prayer.

I beg to suggest that perhaps one way we can arouse and capture the fascination of our congregation - and would-be parishioners in particular - is by introducing spiritual testimony, say once monthly for a start.

I believe that spiritual testimony is part of Calvinistic Evangelism. It can arouse spiritual discipline, while strengthening, nourishing, and sustaining those who have found favor with Jesus, as well as drawing those who have a craving for Jesus. It can be boring, but with a stipulation of 5 minutes at most, it may become a reality.
